FROM THE PRESIDENT:

A presidential election was held in 1892 and the exchanges between Grover Cleveland and Benjamin Harrison were, at times, superficial and distasteful. Typical of election year politics, the two candidates avoided the toughest questions facing Americans at the time. Maybe the lack of substance to the political debate is what prompted a subcommittee of the illustrious Committee of Ten to proclaim the need for all high school students to take four years of history courses about America and the outside world. Woodrow Wilson was involved in the subcommittee's work. The study of history, they said, best prepared the student to exert "a salutary influence upon the affairs of his country," because it best promoted "the invaluable mental power which we call judgment."

Judgment. We demand it in every area of life. The level of political debate will be raised when politicians are convinced that a fair number of citizens possess judgment. Our forefathers thought the study of history a necessity in order to cultivate a capacity for judgment. This is a statewide election year. In some respects, not much has changed since 1892.

HISTORIC CHURCH MAKES CHANGES

Several changes have recently been made at Mount Carmel United Methodist Church. The parking lot has been paved and circular curbing has been placed around the trees. A gazebo is being constructed to house the beautiful old bell which was removed from the Letohatchie United Methodist Church which was organized in 1865. This bell is huge weighing over 500 lbs. and has two clappers. There is extensive lettering on the bell which we will be writing about in a later Newsletter as it is of historical interest. We are advised by a member of Mount Carmel church that this is a BELL, not a bell. The members hope to have the BELL in place for Homecoming Sunday which is always the first Sunday in May. Along with the recent improvements at Mount Carmel cemetery, it is worth a trip to Mount Carmel to see the "new look" of an old church. May 1 will be an important date in the history of this church.

WHAT EVER HAPPENED TO THE OLD WORDS?

I doubt my grandfather would recognize the English language if he were alive today. It is a far cry from the language
he knew and employed prior to his death in 1944. Somewhere
along the line many words have changed drastically to the
point of having become obsolete or in some cases extinct.

If my grandfather characterized a friend as not feeling well, he would use the word puny, which simply meant not "up to snuff." On the other hand, if the friend was indeed ill and had been to see a doctor, he would use the word pekid, instead of puny, which meant that the friend had changed color and needed medicine.

Bilious was a term used almost exclusively by the affluent, which meant that an individual was either puny or peekid, but nobody knew exactly what was wrong with him.

Also, back then people got "stove up" a lot. It was sort of a cover-everything term. And some people were just "under the weather," which covered everything from a chest cold to being kicked by a mule.
