Pine Level, ALA., March 10- (Special) - Members of the Smilietown Community Club are setting the pace for other clubs in the county which have set for their goal for year an adequate orchard for the farm home.

The 38 members have already planted 150 apple trees, 163 peach trees, 27 pear trees, 21 plum trees, and 33 fig trees this season. They have also set out 3,000 strawberry plants and 16 dewberry plants.

All home demonstration clubs of the county became particularly interested in the growing of fruits when the present leadership school in farm-home-living, being taught monthly for club directors, opened the past September. The orchard requirements for the club goal were set by Julian Brown, of Auburn, horticulturist of the Alabama Extension Service who conducts the leadership school.

Smilietown club has an interested record of community leadership and service, beginning with its organization 10 years ago. The club was organized in April 1924, with 14 chapter members, six of whom are still on the roll. Of the present membership of 38, eight were enrolled during 1933. The membership represents six different rural communities, namely Pine Level, Macedonia, Smilietown, Feltondale and Dublin.

In, 1933 the club reached a superlative record for community service. One member alone voluntarily became an individual demonstrator and carried the extension course in foods and nutrition into the homes of 22 women unable to be members of a club. She taught them the proper diets for the sick and for weight control, the value of fresh vegetables and the necessity of milk in the daily diet and the best ways of fixing school lunches. She led them in community parties and opened up them new avenues of recreation. She gave them flower seed and encouraged the planting of flowers.

This member said: "I gave in my home the demonstrations in table service, steam pressure dinner, meat canning and tomato canning. Through Miss Kennedy and Mrs. Thorington, our county agent, I gave these women 128 magazines, 30 recipe books, four food preservation books, and 16 food books for 4-H girls. They reported reading 1,048 articles on nutrition. Each woman reported having passed on to some one else the things she had gotten from the lessons. There were 22 women in the class and their children numbered 73."

Besides the regular monthly meetings, the club sponsored nine community meetings, three of which were demonstrations in canning meats, four were to carry the lessons of foods and nutrients to women not attending club meeting and two were to pass on Christmas ideas. In preparing to give these demonstrations, 86 visits were made by the club directors.

As a result of the nutrition study, a large percentage of the members have worked out food budgets and are trying to serve meals according to the proved plans.
