SCHOOL CENSUS TO BEGIN MONDAY, COUNTY ANNOUNCES

The quadrennial school census will get under way Monday and be completed in the month of July, Miss Thelma Jones, county school attendance supervisor, announces.

Children between the ages of six and 21 will be counted for the Board of Education and deaf, blind and other and otherwise handicapped persons under 50 years of age will be counted for the State Rehabilitation Dept.

All families are asked to be on the lookout for their census enumerator and to cooperate in giving the necessary information. Miss Jones says each enumerator will be given credentials from the school superintendent so there can be no doubt about his identity.

Thirty men and women will take the census in the city and seven in the rural beats. For the first time Chisholm will be in the city area.
