CERTIFICATES AWARDED PUPILS AT PIKE ROAD FOR HEALTH WORK

Certificates for the completion of an eight weeks course in community sanitation were awarded 20 pupils of Catoma School last week by Dr. AH Graham, county health officer.

The children were instructed by PJ O'Neill, county sanitation officer with the co-operation of their respective principals, JC Robertson Jr., of Pike Road, and Guy Duncan, of Catoma.

The course consisted of a series of motion pictures and lectures with the distribution of booklets and pamphlets on the protection of water supplies, sanitary pit privy construction, septic tank construction, fish pond construction, sanitary garbage disposal, food and milk sanitation, and the control of rats, flies and malaria.

All educational material was furnished by the County Health Department and each pupil was given a complete study course in each phase of sanitation.

FARMERS SHOW GROWING INTEREST IN CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WORK

The growing membership of farmers in the Montgomery Chamber of Commerce is changing the identity of the group from a city organization to an area-wide unit. At present, farm membership are listed from Montgomery and Autauga Counties only, but farmers from any adjoining county, will be welcomed into the Chamber.

The creation of an agriculture team by the Chamber of Commerce and the employment of C. Edwin Teague as agricultural director to work hand in hand with the farmers is largely responsible for the growing interest of farmers in becoming members.

John A. Garrett, Snowdoun dairyman, is chairman of the agriculture team. The members represent various rural communities. They are: T. Whit Athey Jr., Grady, cattleman; James G. McLean Chambers Road, cattleman G. C. Passmore, Old Selma Road, cattleman Will Howard Smith, Autauga County farmer and cattleman, and one city members, Glenn Stebbins, manager of Union Stock Yards.

The major work of the agriculture team in the past year has been the promotion of livestock shows and sales and they have had such success that a show or sale has been held at State Coliseum almost monthly, and Montgomery has been host to county, district, state, southeastern and national cattle shows and sales. Among them were the National Polled Shorthorn Congress, the Southeastern Polled Shorthorn Show and Sale, the Southeastern Aberdeen-Angus Show and Sale, the Montgomery County and the Montgomery District 4-H, FFA Fat Stock Show and Sale for Negroes and whites, the Montgomery County and the Montgomery District Dairy Exposition, Jersey heifer sale, feeder calf sale. Hereford bull sales and hog sales.

However, the group stands ready to assist the farmers with problems or promotions at any time. They have co-operated regularly with the County Extension Service in tours and other county-wide events.

An even dozen farms, 10 from Montgomery County and two from Autauga hold membership in the Chamber of Commerce. They are: Athey Polled Hereford Farm, Grady Lynton A. Caldwell Cattle Farm, Baughn Road; John A. Garrett Dairy Farm; Hanchey Mill Road; W. C. Gray Cotton and Cattle Farm, Teasley's; Hall Brothers Dairy Farm, Snowdoun; James G. McLean Shorthorn Farm, Chambers Road; E. W. Norris Poultry and Cattle Farm, Bell Road'; G. C. Passmore Angus Farm, Old Selma Road; W. H. Pirtle Dairy Farm, Snowdoun; Teague Dairies, Snowdoun, McQueen-Smith Farms and Guy C. Youngerman Cattle Farm, Autauga County.

Farms, which are classed as individual members, pay \$30 a year for membership. They may be paid monthly, quarterly or annually.

RAMER PARENT-TEACHERS GROUP COMPLETES OUTSTANDING YEAR

Ramer-P-TA has just completed one of the most outstanding years in its history.

Adopting the improvement of the school cafeteria as the major project, the P-TA has painted the interior, rearranged the kitchen, added a storage room, improved the tables, and bought around 100 trays. Approximately \$600 spent on these improvements was raised through sponsorship of a Halloween carnival, selling drinks at football games, and two chicken suppers, with the finance committee in charge. Contributions for the trays were made by patrons and interested friends of the school, who gave around \$200. Mrs. J. W. Sellers, veteran member of the P-TA and mother of the president, Mrs. S. E. Armistead, "adopted" this project and made a house to house canvass of the entire school area to get the contributions.

Attendance at the meetings has averaged 100 to 125 and all the benefit events were well attended. Attendance ran to 75 on the afternoon the storm hit Montgomery County in March. The P-TA gave money for an attendance prize to the classroom placing first at the end of the year.

The organization won the Gold Leaf award for membership and a ribbon for making four of the five points in the "Star of Membership." The P-TA paid for transportation of 35 to 50 children to each of the Children's Theater plays in Montgomery, prepared and served refreshments at a countywide workshop for teachers, helped with flower arrangements for graduation and other school events, and sponsored the summer roundup for children entering school next year, in which a group of physicians and specialists examined the children. Virtually every member of the organization served in some capacity during the year, and every community in the school area was hostess at one or more meetings.

Mrs. Armistead attended the P-TA Institute at the University of Alabama in the summer of 1951, and one or more officers attended the State P-TA Congress in Montgomery, the county school of instruction, and parent-education study courses.

Programs were given on health, recreation and other timely subjects, featuring outstanding guest speakers. Community night was observed. A joint meeting was held with the Pine Level P-TA. A Christmas concert by Ramer Choral Club was featured at the December meeting.
